<u>Reading</u> - Key texts: Over The Line by Tom Palmer

Developing pleasure and motivation to read. Word reading and comprehension skills through a variety of text types during VIPERS reading sessions and written activities.

Reading skill focus - summarising and retrieving information along with inference. Choosing own texts and sustained reading for pleasure.

Dictionary use to check meaning and

Dictionary use to check meaning thesaurus to learn synonyms.

<u>Speaking and Listening:</u> Poetry recitals, discussion and presentation during topic work, hot seating characters and drama. Children will debate points of view.

<u>Writing Composition</u> - Writing for different purposes, developing stamina, editing and checking work throughout.

Narrative: Using our key text to help inspire the writing of a setting description of the WW1 Trenches. Using real WW1 letters from soldiers to their loved ones to create our own.

Non-fiction: Writing a formal letter to companies in the local area to gain funding for our Year 5 residential.

Poetry: Using 'Flanders Fields' to create our own rondeau.

Spelling: Weekly spelling lesson, focusing on spelling patterns.

Grammar: Expanded noun phrases,

relative causes,

Handwriting: Weekly practise based on spelling patterns. Emphasis on neat presentation and pride in all written work.

Religious Education

(According to Warwickshire and Coventry agreed syllabus for RE 2017)

Key Question: Why do some people believe God exists?

Pupils learn from different religious and non-religious groups about belief in God.
Pupils raise questions about the nature and existence of God focussing on Christian ideas about God. Pupils will consider why people do or don't believe in God and the impact that might have on the way they live their everyday life.

Maths

Daily focus activities around multiplication tables. Weekly Written Arithmetic work.

Addition and Subtraction

Add and subtract numbers up to 4 digits using the column method. Tackle addition and subtraction problems that will involve one or more exchange. Solve problems that require up to 2 steps.

Multiplication & Division

Common multiples and factors. Prime and square numbers. Cube numbers. Multiply and divide by 10,100 and 1000.

Fractions

Finding equivalent fractions. Converting improper fractions to mixed numbers.

Spreadsheets

Use formulae within a spreadsheet to convert measurements of length and distance. To use the count tool to answer hypotheses about common letters in use. To use a spreadsheet to model a real-life problem. To create formulae that use text variables. To use a spreadsheet to help plan a school cake sale.

Science

Chemicals and Mixtures

Compare materials based on their properties. Know that some materials dissolve in liquid to form a solution and know how to recover the substance. Use knowledge of solids, liquids and gasses to decide how mixtures could be separated. demonstrate that dissolving, mixing and changes of state are reversible changes. Explain that some changes result in the formation of new materials and are usually irreversible.
