English

<u>Reading</u> - Key texts: Survivors by David Long and Shackleton's Journey by William Grill.

Developing pleasure and motivation to read. Word reading and comprehension skills through a variety of text types during VIPERS reading sessions and written activities. (Weekly skills building)
Instructional texts on survival, Information text about survival stories, News Reports about exploratory missions. Biographical writing about famous explorers. Poetry around the theme of icy landscapes. Reading skill focus -developing inference and explanation skills- utilising evidence from the text to support views. Choosing texts and sustained reading for pleasure. Dictionary use to check meaning and spelling.

<u>Speaking and Listening:</u> Discussions on the effects of global warming. Hotseatating famous explorers.

Writing Composition - Writing for different purposes, developing stamina, editing and improving work throughout. Narrative: Writing letters and recounts in role as crew members from Shackleton's Journey.

Nonfiction: using features of biographical writing to recount the events from Sheckleton's life. Utilising formal language of discussion to write an argument.

Poetry: Utilising imagery-simile, metaphor, personification to create detailed descriptions of settings and atmosphere. Spelling: Weekly spelling lesson on the following patterns: adding suffixes beginning with vowels to -fer, words with a long /e/ sound spelt 'ie' or 'ei', words that belong to the same family -mit, -inter and words from the Statutory Spelling List for Year 5/6. Grammar:. Using brackets, commas and dashes- parenthesis. Formal and informal vocabulary structures appropriate for formal speech and writing. Identifying subjunctive verb forms. Synonyms and antonyms. Commas to clarify meaning. Using colons to mark boundaries between independent clauses. Handwriting: Weekly practise based on spelling patterns. Emphasis on neat presentation and pride in all written work.

Religious Education

Key Question: What does it mean to be a Muslim in Britain today? Make connections between Muslim practice of the Five Pillars and their beliefs about God and the Prophet Muhammad. Describe the forms of guidance a Muslim uses and compare them to forms of guidance experienced by the pupils Make connections between the key functions of the mosque and the beliefs of Muslims.

Maths

Shape and Measure: Position and Direction

Identifying and plotting points in all four quadrants. Translating, reflecting and rotating shapes on a coordinate plane.

Number: Ratio

Understanding the language and symbols used in ratio. Knowing that ratio is created using multiplication and its relation to fractions. Solve problems using ratio and proportion.

Number: Algebra

Find rules for one and two step sequences.
Substitute values into simple formulas. Forming and solving equations with up to 2 steps. Finding pairs of missing values.

Spreadsheets

Create formulas in a spreadsheet to help convert measurements and complete calculations. Use filtering tools to answer questions about a set of data.

Children will use a 'How Many?' tool. Create formulae that use different variables. Children can use a spreadsheet to model a real-life situation and come up with solutions that can be practically applied.

Living things and their habitats

Describe how living things are classified into broad groups according to common observable characteristics and based on similarities and differences, including micro-organisms, plants and animals.

Give reasons for classifying plants and animals based on specific characteristics.
